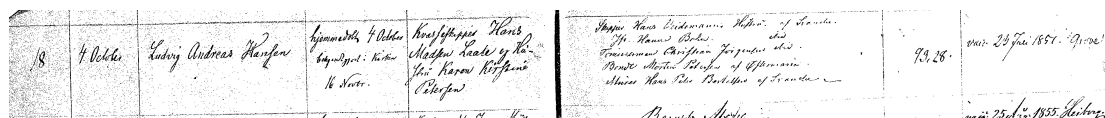

Louis Andrew Hanson, Sr. was baptized Ludvig Andreas Hansen as son of Karen Kirstine Pedersdatter (Petersen) and Hans Madsen Lolle, Svaneke, Danmark (In the parish register for Svaneke, the fathers surname is spelled Laale, the original way of

spelling the surname is Lolle, as found in the parish register for Bodilsker under Hans Madsen Lolle, where both he and his father's surnames are spelled Lolle)

Ludvig Andreas Hansen was Chandler in naval supplies and ship owner together with Andrew Smith (Hanson and Smith). Together with W. R. Kenan they also owned a pitch pine wood distillery and got many patents for the production and products. L A Hanson was child in a sailors family and so, very religious. He has written a little book for his children; Louis A. Hanson: "Life, Faith, and Duty". In several letters to his sister and brother in law he told them to be patient and pray to God. Normally he also wrote that he would pray for her sister and later for his niece. He had sorrow himself after losing 2 daughters.

About 1882 Louis A Hanson built a house in Italianate style with Steamboat Gothic decoration, 114 Nun Street, New Hanover County, Wilmington, now named "Hansen House". *Saved for preservation by:*

The neighbor, 116 Nun Street, was the Andrew Smith family. Now "Andrew Smith House". Italianate style house built about 1880 for Andrew Smith (1844-1907), a native of Sweden. He was a partner in Smith & Hanson, ship chandlers. Later engaged in real estate and brick manufacture. In 1903 Louis A. Hanson is registered as living at 416 South Front Street, New Hanover County, Wilmington N C, just around the corner. This house is bigger than 114 nun Street, and gave room for more children.

Cerrie, daughter, 18 years, unoccupied.

I have not been able to find anything about Bertie, Carrie (1901), and very little on David. David has made a patent in 1919 and in the Fourteenth Census of the United States he is mentioned as manufacturer of chemicals. Edward was soldier in both World War I and II, and Louis A Jr. was manager of Spiritine Chemical Company. Henry W A was a respectable dr. and president of Gettysburg College, Pennsylvania.

There are no Hansons living at 416 South Front Street after 1924. It becomes the Sutton-Council Furniture Company. Louis A. Hanson, Jr. is living at 15, S. 19th St. in the 1924 city directory. He is listed on the 1930 census as living at 11, 8th St.

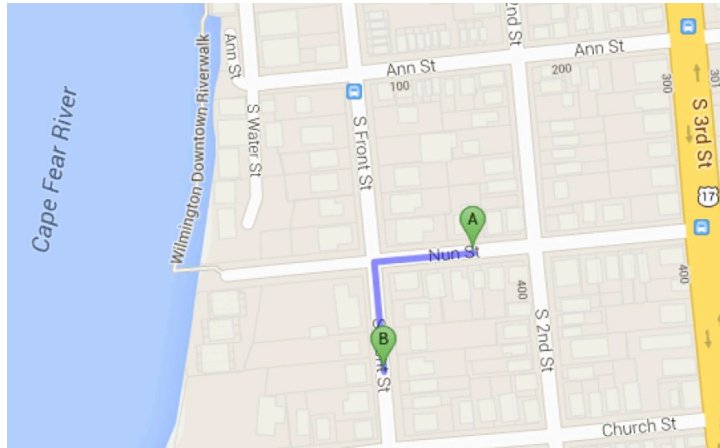

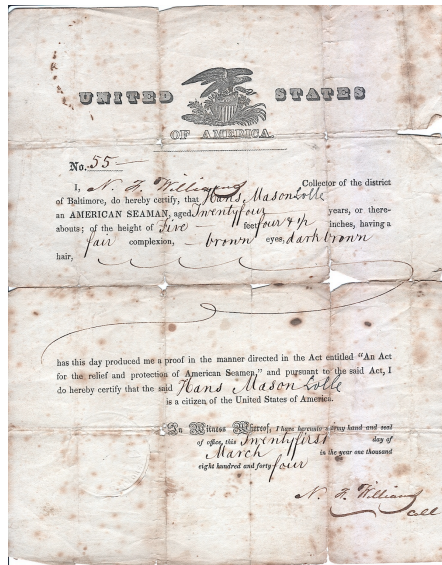

Hans Madsen Lolle (born in Bodilsker Bornholm Denmark 25. Aug. 1817) son of Hans Jensen Lolle and wife Elisa Madsdatter

Hans Madsen Lolle was a sailor before he married Karen Kirstine Pedersdatter and he had a letter of citizenship of Baltimore, USA from 1844 03 21 (picture on top of page 8).



Karen Kirstine Pedersdatter was a widow with 2 children when Hans Madsen Lolle married her probably in 1845.

 Jørgen Peter Andersen
 Caroline Christine Andersen (1838 -).

The 2 children of the marriage with Hans Madsen Lolle were
 Madsine Cecilie Marie Hansen (1846 – 1913)
 Ludvig Andreas Hansen (1850 – 1921).

Ludvig Andreas Hansen's sister Caroline Christine Juul born Andersen married Marius Jensen Juul, (1832 -), mate, Christiansø, later captain and ship owner in Svaneke. Marius bought the Hanson and Smith owned ship "Rialto" in January 1883 for 5000 USD and he sold it again in February 1891 to Simrishamn, Sweden for 10500 DKK.

Ludvig Andreas Hansen's sister *Madsine Cecilie Marie Nielsen born Hansen* married my grand grand father Otto Wilhelm Nielsen (1831 – 1915) and they had 2 children.

Anna Wilhelmine Kristine Nielsen (1873 – 1915), photographer, Vesterbrogade 56, Copenhagen

Otto Ludvig Rasmus Nielsen (1875 – 1932). Translator and head insurance agent; my grand father.

Otto L. R. Nielsen (1875 10 10) was, as a boy of 13 years in the summer 1889, send to Wilmington, N C to work for his uncle Ludvig. He has told my father that he worked in the harbor together with "niggers". They taught him to catch rattlesnakes, kill them, and prepare them for a meal. He also joined a music band in Wilmington. He played the trombone. While staying in Wilmington Otto was bitten by a mosquito, which resulted in malaria and eating kinin tablets when the fever came. Later he had his own shop together with MacDonald; Neslon and MacDonald brokers in Paints, colors, varnishes and putty also naval stores, gum, thus, pitch, tar, rosin oil, beck and spar oil, spiritine oil. 40 Broad Street, New York. Otto L. Nelson and Chas. E. MacDonald. He returned to Denmark in 1900 because of his mother's illness, fell in love in a girl in Denmark and never returned to USA.

These two pictures are very interesting, because they are taken on the same occasion of the same person, possibly Louis Andrew Lolle Hanson. The **left picture** was send to Louis A. Hanson, Sr.'s family in Svaneke, Bornholm (now in Øarkivet, Rønne, Denmark), and the **right picture** was send to Madsine and Otto W. Nielsen in Copenhagen, but no date (now in Ringsted, Denmark). On the back of the right picture my uncle Harry H. Nielsen has written with pencil, that it is his father with a trombone in uniform, but not a soldier. I think that my uncle was wrong. So, I checked the pictures and analyzed the noses and the eyebrows of Otto L. R. Nielsen and Louis A. L. Hanson on other photos. It cannot be my grand father, because his nose was not straight. It was curved as in contrast to Louis's nose. It was straight. Convince yourself by watching the two pictures below. Further more, a proud father would not send two nearly identical pictures of his nephew to Denmark. Of course, he would have send pictures of his own son, the dauphin, next generation in Spiritine Chemical Company.
